# New vaccine

The U.S. approved updated COVID-19 Noun Plural Monday, hoping to Verb Base Form up protection against the Adjective Ends in EST coronavirus strains and blunt any Noun this fall and Noun.

The Food and Noun Administration decision opens the Adjective Ends in EST shots from Moderna and Company name and its Noun BioNTech to most Americans even if they've never had a coronavirus Noun. It's part of a shift to treat fall Noun Plural of the COVID-19 vaccine much like getting a yearly Noun shot.

There's still another step: The Noun Plural for Disease Verb Base Form and Prevention must sign off . A CDC advisory Noun is set to issue Noun Plural Tuesday on who most needs the updated Noun Plural. Vaccinations could begin Adjective ending in er this week, and both the COVID-19 and Noun shot can be given at the same Noun.

COVID-19 hospitalizations have been Verb Present ends in ING since late summer although -- thanks to lasting Noun from prior Noun Plural and infections -- not nearly as much as this Noun last year.
