There is much we can learn about quotations. Most of our \_\_\_\_\_ Noun - Plural will probably come from chapter 13 in The Chicago Manual of \_\_\_\_\_ Noun (as well as the IS Style Guide). In all, chapter 13 of The Chicago Manual of Style is a very useful place to look when you want to learn how to create the most quintessential quotations that you ever did see.
