Declaration

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are <u>Verb - Past Participle</u> <u>Adjective</u>, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain <u>Adjective</u> Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the their just powers from the consent of the governed, --That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new Noun laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their <u>Noun</u> and Happiness. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under ______ Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future ______.--Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute ______ over these States. To prove this, let Facts be submitted to a <u>Adjective</u> world.
