Declaration

We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are _____ Verb - Past Participle _____ Adjective _____, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain _____ Adjective _____ Rights, that among these are Life, Liberty and the pursuit of _____ Proper Noun _____.--That to secure these rights, Governments are instituted among Men, deriving their just powers from the consent of the governed, --That whenever any Form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the Right of the People to alter or to abolish it, and to institute new _____ Noun _____, laying its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their _____ Noun _____ and Happiness. Prudence, indeed, will dictate that _____ Noun - Plural _____ long established should not be changed for light and transient causes; and accordingly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to _____ Verb _____, while evils are _____ Adjective _____, than to right themselves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pursuing invariably the same Object evinces a design to reduce them under _____ Adjective _____ Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and to provide new Guards for their future _____ Noun _____.--Such has been the patient sufferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former Systems of Government. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute _____ Noun _____ over these States.
