# Electronic Surveillance

National Security officials have long had the legal authority to listen in on the conversations of \_\_\_\_\_ Noun - \_\_\_\_\_ Plural and \_\_\_\_\_ Noun - Plural. The Communications Assistance to Law Enforcement Act allows for lawful interception of communications and applies to \_\_\_\_\_ Noun - Plural and providers of broadband internet. With the explosion of \_\_\_\_\_ Noun, however, officials say their ability to monitor communications is "going dark," cutting them off from critical conversations between \_\_\_\_\_ Noun - Plural and hindering their investigations. Further, some companies offer \_\_\_\_\_ Noun that are encrypted between users, so they are unable to decipher the communications even after they grab them.
