university. But, recently found out that JCU's closest fellow,
Noun, has lower prices for Noun.
Verb - 3rd Person Singular Present passes at JCU cost \$325 for a year and \$175 for a semester, while
Noun - Plural passes at cost \$130 a year and \$65 a semester for on-campus students.
The price difference is drastic, especially considering that a year-long pass at costs less than a
semester pass at JCU.
All of the general rules and regulations for at both universities are basically the same. Students of
all years are allowed to bring to campus, and upperclassmen are given priority for
Noun . Noun passes are non-transferable, and there are certain hours and days for free and
restricted Noun.
Some believe that the reason for the price difference is the number of spots available on campus. JCU has 1,500
Noun - Plural available, while Noun has 1,700.
Another thing that influences the price of could be the number of students who have cars on
campus and the availability of those spots, said, "Anyone who applies for a permit
will receive one."
Taylor also noted that students who live on campus purchased 579 Noun-Plural, leaving 100
