# Mystery Toy

Your goal is to figure out the real toy this Madlib describes. Good luck! This line of Toy - Plural created by American art student, Xavier Roberts, in 1978 was originally called "Adjective Noun - Plural".

The original Repeat Last Toy - Plural were made of Adjective Material and sold at local Noun shows, then later at Noun Land General Hospital in Cleveland. Roberts converted a Adjective Location into a retail unit and mini-theme park from which to sell his Repeat Last Toy - Plural. The facility is presented as a Verb - Present ends in ING, nursery, and Noun - Ending in TION center for premium Repeat Last Toy - Plural. In accordance with the theme, employees dress and act the parts of the Profession - Plural and Profession - Plural caring for the Repeat Last Toy - Plural as if they are real Animal (plural). One of the Repeat Last Toy - Plural wears a Article of Clothing and talks. It says things like: "Exclamation". It has a Part of Body that can be pressed to make it Verb - Base Form, and has two metal pieces in its Part of Body that make it Verb - Base Form. In 1983, the Repeat Last Toy - Plural were introduced at the International Toy Fair in NYC. By October, riots were Verb - Present ends in ING in stores around the country. The Repeat Last Toy - Plural were named the official mascot of the 1992 US Olympic team and members of the team were given their own Adjective Repeat Last Toy - Plural to take to the games. As one of the most popular toy fads of the 1980's, the Repeat Last Toy - Plural also became one of the longest-running toy franchises in America.
