Amphibians

Amphibians are Noun - Plural. You'll find them near or in a Noun or stream, or on dry land, and most will have Adjective skin. All of them have backbones, and they have no scales or fur. Plus, they're all cold-blooded, which affects their temperature. Unlike you or me, they have their body temp Verb - Past Tense by what's in their environment: from cool...to hot...to warm. Amphibians are born from Noun - Plural that don't have any shell. Instead, the eggs are made from something Adjective, like a Noun. When most are born, they breathe through Noun beneath the Noun, and as they get older, they'll grow lungs and spend more time on land. Some have Adjective skin, while some have dots, or stripes. And all around the world, there are a host of different types. Noun - Plural are in this class, or group. The same is true of animal. At birth, they're both called tadpoles or sometimes Noun. The kids don't look like grown-ups (not even just a "tad") when they've first Verb - Past Tense, but over time, they'll look like Proper Noun and dad. Salamanders tend to like the damp and dark to thrive. Their front feet mainly have number toes. Their back feet? Mostly five. Amphibians are Adjective! They've survived throughout the ages.
