T.S Eliot was born on September 26th in St. Louis, Missouri in the United States. He also wrote the well known Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats (1939) which was later produced into the \_\_\_\_\_ Noun Cats. T. S. Eliot \_\_\_\_\_ Verb - Past Tense the Nobel Prize for \_\_\_\_\_ Noun in 1948, and died in London in 1965.
