T.S Eliot was born on September 26th in St. Louis, Missouri in the United States. He later \_\_\_\_\_  
to the United Kingdom in 1914, when he was 25 years old. \_\_\_\_\_ from a congenital double  
inguinal hernia, Eliot could not participate in many physical activities which prevented him from

. He also wrote the well known Old Possum's Book of Practical Cats (1939) which was later produced into the  
\_\_\_\_\_ Cats. T. S. Eliot \_\_\_\_\_ the Nobel Prize for \_\_\_\_\_ in 1948, and died in  
London in 1965.
