# How to Run a Webshow

Running a webshow is not as hard as you might think it is. You only need a few things to get started: a camera, a \_\_\_\_\_ Noun account, and a computer with some \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective \_\_\_\_\_ Noun software on it.

Make sure that you film in an \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective place. Nothing is more distracting to your audience than having someone \_\_\_\_\_ Verb - Present ends in ING in your shot or \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective sounds in the background. Also be sure that you have your lighting set-up optimally, post-production can only fix so many \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective mistakes.

Have a plan when for what is going to happen in your show. Do you want what you say to be \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective or do you want to make certain points about \_\_\_\_\_ Noun? These are good things to know before you start \_\_\_\_\_ Verb - Present ends in ING, and will save you lots of time later when you are \_\_\_\_\_ Verb - Present ends in ING.

Lastly, be \_\_\_\_\_ Verb - Base Form worthy. You can do all the \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective work want, but it won't amount to anything if you can't build up an audience who will \_\_\_\_\_ Verb your show. Finding what makes you \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective and making it your strength is the first step to getting a \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective audience.
