The Day of Love

Valentine's day is a <u>Adjective</u> celebration each year, especially when you receive <u>Noun</u> and <u>Noun - Plural</u> from your friends. There is a lot more to this day. This meant that the sender would remain a mystery until they could talk to each other. Even before this time, in the late 1700s, printers would create large amounts of Valentine's Day cards so that <u>Noun - Plural</u> and <u>Noun - Plural</u> could

Verb them.

In the last few decades, Valentine's day has changed a lot! Today we still exchange <u>Noun - Plural</u>, but many people buy cards instead of <u>Verb - Present Tense</u> them. We also give flowers (usually a bouquet of red
