The SEE ranges from Levels 1-6, with Level 1 reflecting an extremely limited conversational Noun ,
and Level 6 reflecting the Adjective Adverb ability of a well-spoken, highly-educated
 Noun .

SEE Levels are based on the SEE Simplified Rubric, developed from the Common Adjective Framework
of Reference for Languages. Like the CEFR, our Noun approaches English speaking with the
philosophy of Noun as communicative - that is, language is about social Noun .

Vericant's SEE score reflects an interviewee's spoken English ability as Verb - Past Tense analytically
across five Noun - Plural : Vocabulary Range, Grammatical Accuracy, Fluency, Conversational Interaction
, and Coherence. Scoring is completed by two individual Noun - Plural extensively trained on the SEE
Detailed Rubric. Final SEE Scores are Verb - Past Tense to both institutions and applicants to an accuracy
of one decimal point.
