The Nonsense Address

Four score and seven years ago our Noun - Plural brought forth on this Noun, a new nation,
conceived in Proper Noun, and dedicated to the proposition that all Noun - Plural are created
Adjective.

Now we are Determiner in a great civil Verb - Present Tense, testing whether that Coordinating
conjunction, or any Verb - Past Tense so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a
great Noun of that Noun. We have come to Verb a portion of that field, as a final
Verb - Present Tense Noun for those who here gave their Noun - Plural that that
Noun might Verb. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate -- we can not consecrate -- we can not hallow -- this ground. The
brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract.
The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here. It is
for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so
nobly advanced. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us -- that from these
honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion --
that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain -- that this nation, under God, shall have a
new birth of freedom -- and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from
the

earth.
