which includes both <u>Noun</u> and the <u>Noun - Plural</u> Academy (Interlochen's boarding high school



So, what is your contribution to this experience? Listen, take it all in, stay open, stay

quick to judge. Both of these pitfalls are personal traps that can be very difficult to climb

out of. Theatre is a collaborative art form, and the joy of journeying through a successful

process alongside your fellow young artists with a final product the entire department can

believe in and celebrate is the ultimate goal of our work here.

The work ethics, practices and habits you are developing now - both good and bad - will

solidify more rapidly than you can imagine. The way you conduct yourself in your work

here at Interlochen may very well define your life and your art over the years to come.

Over the next several days you will be auditioning for your directors and for student

directors in the motion picture arts division. It is vital that you remember this - your

casting and performance assignments do not define who you are, nor do they measure

your worth as a person and an artist unless you allow them to do so! Let me say that

again: your casting does not define who you are, and it does not measure your worth as a

person and an artist unless you allow it to do so! Many of the very best students we have

had here - at both Academy and Camp - are the ones who have stood out in small roles,

done passionate work in their studios and classes, and made the absolute most of every

opportunity with which they were presented. Always keep close to your heart one of the

quotes of Konstantin Stanislavsky (who founded modern acting theory in Russia over 100

years ago): "There are no small roles in any play; there are only actors who prove too

small to fill out the potential of the rich characterizations that such roles promise." Let me

repeat that one again: "There are no small roles in any play; there are only actors who

So make this your goal: commit 100% to your work here: your classes; your rehearsals;

your homework; and your performances. Although this may seem a lofty goal, it is one

that is essential if you strive to be a young artist. If you aim for this, the return on your

personal investment will be both surprising and rewarding. If something is worth doing,

it's worth doing all the way, with every imaginable bit of effort that you have.

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
