## Who is Alabama quarterback Tua Tagovailoa?

Sometimes, it pays to wait and watch, <u>Verb Present ends in ING</u> your <u>Noun Plural</u> until you can show the world just what you can do.

For Tua Tagovailoa, his chance came on college football's <u>Adjective Ends in EST</u> stage, when Alabama Coach Nick Saban decided at halftime to replace quarterback Jalen Hurts with his freshman from Hawaii, a guy who had been offered a <u>Noun</u> only after Jake Fromm <u>Verb Past Tense</u> his <u>Repeat Last Noun</u> at Georgia.
