There are those who are asking the devotees of civil rights, 'When will you be _____?' We can never be _____ as long as the Negro is the victim of the _____ horrors of police brutality. We can never be _____ as long as our bodies, heavy with the fatigue of travel, cannot gain lodging in the motels of the highways and the hotels of the cities. *We cannot be satisfied as long as the negro's basic mobility is from a _____ ghetto to a _____ one. We can never be _____ as long as our children are stripped of their self-hood and robbed of their dignity by a sign stating: 'For Whites Only.'* We cannot be _____ as long as a Negro in Mississippi cannot vote and a Negro in New York believes he has

nothing for which to vote. No, no, we are not _____ Adjective _____ and we will not be _____ Adjective _____ until 'justice rolls down like waters, and righteousness like a mighty stream.'

I am not unmindful that some of you have come here out of _____ Adjective _____ trials and tribulations. Some of you have come fresh from _____ Adjective _____ jail cells. And some of you have come from areas where your quest -- quest for freedom left you battered by the storms of persecution and staggered by the winds of police brutality.
