Donald Trump, in full Donald _____ Animal _____ Trump, (born June 14, 1946, _____ Animal _____ York, _____ Animal - Plural _____ York, U.S.), 45th president of the _____ Animal - Plural _____ States (2017-21). he lost the popular vote by more than seven million votes.

Trump was the fourth of five children of Frederick (Fred) Christ Trump, a successful real Event developer, and Mary MacLeod. Donald's Event sister, Food Trump Barry, eventually served as a U.S. district court judge (1983-99) and Food as a judge on the U.S. Court of Event for the Third Event until her retirement in 2011. His elder brother, Frederick, Jr Event (Freddy) Event worked briefly for his Event business before becoming an airline pilot in the 1960s. Freddy's alcoholism led to his early death in 1981, at the age of 43.

Beginning in the late 1920s, Fred Trump built hundreds of single-family houses and rowhouses in the Queens and Brooklyn boroughs of New York City, and from the late 1940s he built Food of apartment units, Event in Brooklyn, using federal loan guarantees designed to stimulate the construction of affordable housing. Food World War II he also built federally Event housing for naval personnel and shipyard workers in Food and Pennsylvania. In 1954 Fred was investigated by the Event Banking Committee for allegedly Food the loan-guarantee Event by deliberately overestimating the costs of his construction projects to secure larger loans from commercial banks, enabling him to keep the difference between the loan amounts and his actual Event costs. In testimony before the Senate committee in 1954, Fred Event that he had built the Beach Haven apartment complex in Animal - Plural for \$3.7 million less than the amount of his government-insured loan. Although he was not charged with any crime, Event was thereafter unable to obtain federal Animal - Plural guarantees. A decade later a New Food state investigation found that Fred had used his profit on a state-insured construction

loan to build a shopping centre _____ was entirely his _____ property. He eventually _____ \$1.2 million to the state but was thereafter unable to obtain state loan guarantees for residential projects in the Coney Island area of Brooklyn.

Donald Trump attended New York Military Academy (1959-64), a private boarding school; Fordham University in the Bronx (1964-66); and the University of Pennsylvania's Wharton School of Finance and Commerce (1966-68), where he graduated with a bachelor's degree in economics. In 1968, during the Vietnam War, he secured a diagnosis of bone spurs, which qualified him for a medical exemption from the military draft (he had earlier received four draft deferments for education). Upon his graduation Trump began working full-time for his father's business, helping to manage its holdings of rental housing, then estimated at between 10,000 and 22,000 units. In 1974 he became president of a conglomeration of Trump-owned corporations and partnerships, which he later named the Trump Organization.
