Montgomery was named for General _____ First Name _____ Montgomery, a _____ Cool Name _____ War hero who was killed in battle--even though he never lived in the area. In 1819, the year Alabama became a state, two small _____ Noun Plural _____ merged to form a town named after the general. In _____ Year _____, the city became the county seat (interestingly, Montgomery County was named after a different army major, also named _____ Last Name _____). In 1846, Montgomery became the capital of the entire state. Today, Montgomery's governor's _____ Noun _____ is one of the country's most beautiful _____ Noun Plural _____.

_____ First Name _____ Juneau discovered _____ Noun _____ in Alaska in _____ Year _____ with his prospecting partner, _____ First Name _____ _____ Last Name _____. When other _____ Noun Plural _____ flocked to the area, _____ Person _____ named the resulting town after himself: _____ Name plus burg _____. It was briefly renamed _____ Cool Name _____, ostensibly because there were too many towns in the U.S. named _____ Name plus burg _____. But _____ First Name _____ Juneau felt something in the town should be named for him, and in 1881, he garnered enough support to change the name to _____ Proper Noun _____. In 1906, the city became the territory capital; Alaska officially became a _____ Noun _____, and Juneau the state _____ Noun _____, in 1956. Today, Juneau's natural _____ Noun _____ is offset with one of the strangest roadside attractions in _____ Country _____.
