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Montgomery, Alabama

Montgomery was named for General <u>First Name</u> Montgomery, a <u>Cool Name</u> War hero who was killed in battle--even though he never lived in the area. In 1819, the year Alabama became a state, two small <u>Noun Plural</u> merged to form a town named after the general. In <u>Year</u>, the city became the county seat (interestingly, Montgomery County was named after a different army major, also named <u>Last Name</u>). In 1846, Montgomery became the capital of the entire state. Today, Montgomery's governor's <u>Noun</u> is one of the country's most beautiful <u>Noun Plural</u>.

Juneau, Alaska

<u>First Name</u> Juneau discovered <u>Noun</u> in Alaska in <u>Year</u> with his prospecting partner, <u>First Name</u> <u>Last Name</u>. When other <u>Noun Plurat</u> flocked to the area, <u>Person</u> named the resulting town after himself: <u>Name clus bure</u>. It was briefly renamed <u>Cool Name</u>, ostensibly because there were too many towns in the U.S. named <u>Name clus bure</u>. But <u>First Name</u> Juneau felt something in the town should be named for him, and in 1881, he garnered enough support to change the name to <u>Proper Noun</u>. In 1906, the city became the territory capital; Alaska officially became a <u>Noun</u>, and Juneau the state <u>Noun</u>, in 1956. Today, Juneau's natural <u>Noun</u> is offset with one of the strangest roadside attractions in <u>Country</u>. ©2025 WordBlanks.com · All Rights Reserved.
