Phoenix, Arizona

The city of Phoenix was built on the ruins of the _____ Cool Name Grande settlement, occupied between 700 and 1400 A.D., until it was destroyed, most likely by _____ natural disaster. In 1867, _____ First Name _____ Last Name of _____ City Name, Arizona, introduced irrigation to the area, then known as _____ Last Name Possessive Mill. Another city pioneer, _____ First Name _____ Last Name, suggested the name of Phoenix after the mythical _____ animal that rose from the ashes, just as the new city arose from the grounds of an _____ Adjective one. The name became _____ Adjective in _____ year. Phoenix became the territory capital in 1889, and Arizona became a state in 1912. These days, Phoenix is one of the most _____ Adjective U.S. cities to visit.

Little Rock, Arkansas

_____ First Name de la _____ Last Name, a French explorer from New Orleans, noticed an outcropping of _____ Noun along the banks of the Arkansas River--the first he had seen since leaving New Orleans--which he called la petite _____ Noun (translation: "the _____ Adjective _____ Noun"). In 1803, the United States purchased this area, which was then part of the Louisiana Territory, from France (although it was still occupied by Native _____ Noun Plural). In 1818, boundary lines defining what's now Arkansas were drawn via a treaty that referred to this spot as "Little _____ Noun," and the name stuck. The settlement was designated as the territorial capital in 1820, and in 1836 Arkansas became a state. _____ Adjective fact: _____ Cool Name peanut butter
