Little Rock, Arkansas

_____ de la _____, a French explorer from New Orleans, noticed an outcropping of _____ along the banks of the Arkansas River--the first he had seen since leaving New Orleans--which he called la petite _____ (translation: "the _____"). In 1803, the United States purchased this area, which was then part of the Louisiana Territory, from France (although it was still occupied by Native _____). In 1818, boundary lines defining what's now Arkansas were drawn via a treaty that referred to this spot as "Little _____," and the name stuck. The settlement was designated as the territorial capital in 1820, and in 1836 Arkansas became a state. _____ fact: _____ peanut butter
