Create your lists. If you want to have brought to you, generate a list of the objects to give to
scavenger hunt If you want them to clues, create the list of hints and
the coordinating locations.
4) Hide the clues and/or Make sure they're not in sight.
5) Give each team the list of Noun Plural and/or clues. If you're giving Noun Plural, make sure
each person's are in a different order so they don't each other around.
First one to verb Base Form all the clues and grab the final object verb Present ends in S!
