# JN.1

A highly Adjective, fast-spreading new COVID-19 Noun called JN.1 is on the rise in the United Noun Plural. In recent weeks, JN.1 -- a Adverb mutated subvariant of omicron -- rapidly overtook other variants to become the Adjective strain nationwide.

The JN.1 Repeat Last Noun now accounts for almost two-thirds of Noun Plural in the U.S., and it may be " Verb Present ends in ING the spread of COVID-19 this winter," the CDC said in an Noun on Jan. 5.

According to some Occupation pl and data models, the country may be Verb Present ends in ING its second-largest COVID Noun, smaller than only the omicron Noun in late 2021 and early 2022 .

In the U.S., the share of cases Verb Past Tense by JN.1 has Adverb tripled in the past month. JN.1 is currently considered the fastest-growing Repeat Last Noun in the Noun, according to the U.S. Centers for Noun Control and Prevention.
