Adirondack Chairs

The Adirondack chair is an _____ Adjective lounge chair with _____ Adjective _____ Noun Plural, a tall slatted _____ Noun, and a _____ Noun that is higher in the front than the back. Its name references the Adirondack Mountains in Upstate _____ Noun.

The chair was invented by Thomas Lee between 1900 and 1903 in Westport, New York, but was patented by his friend _____ Famous Person, who added some _____ Adjective adaptations to make it more suitable for _____ Noun Plural. The chairs were popularized in nearby tuberculosis _____ Noun Plural, where they were favored for the way the _____ Noun Plural helped open up the sitter's _____ Body Part. The _____ Adjective chair, however, had a single _____ Noun for the chair back; it was not until 1938 that the fan-shaped back with _____ Noun Plural was patented by _____ Famous Person.

Adirondack chairs are now often made by injection _____ Verb Present ends in ING and can take any form. Since the 1980s, they are generally marketed in _____ Location as "_____ Adjective chairs", although the design did not originate in _____ Location. If you go only slightly North of _____ Location, however, they are more commonly referred to as _____ Adjective Chairs', from the _____ Adjective Chair Company based in _____ Location, who began creating wooden DIY versions in 1987.

At least one _____ Adjective chair has been built as tourist attraction for a _____ Location.
