# Don Imus

Imus began as a radio disc jockey in 1966 at radio station KUTY in Palmdale, California. After hearing the \_\_\_\_\_ Adjective disc-jockey, he went to the nearby \_\_\_\_\_ Proper noun and convinced the owner to hire him, saying he could do a better job. At the time, he was a brakeman on the Southern Pacific Railroad. He stayed at the station for about two years, leaving in 1968. After being \_\_\_\_\_ Past tense verb in Stockton, he went to KXOA in Sacramento, California. His on-air pranks, such as calling up a restaurant and ordering 1200 \_\_\_\_\_ Plural noun to go, made his show immensely popular and boosted ratings.

Don Imus behavior has often drawn the attention of the press. He famously called Rush Limbaugh a fat, pill-popping \_\_\_\_\_ Noun and Lesley Stahl a gutless, lying \_\_\_\_\_ Noun.

His radio show, Imus in the Morning, aired weekday mornings in the drive time slot from 1979 until it was canceled on April 12, 2007 following public objections to \_\_\_\_\_ Plural noun he \_\_\_\_\_ Past tense verb on-air.
