Don Imus

Imus began as a radio disc jockey in 1966 at radio station KUTY in Palmdale, California. After hearing the Adjective disc-jockey, he went to the nearby Proper noun and convinced the owner to hire him, saying he could do a better job. At the time, he was a brakeman on the Southern Pacific Railroad. He stayed at the station for about two years, leaving in 1968. After being Past tense verb in Stockton, he went to KXOA in Sacramento, California. His on-air pranks, such as calling up a restaurant and ordering 1200 Plural noun to go, made his show immensely popular and boosted ratings.

Don Imus behavior has often drawn the attention of the press. He famously called Rush Limbaugh a fat, pill-popping Noun and Lesley Stahl a gutless, lying Noun.

His radio show, Imus in the Morning, aired weekday mornings in the drive time slot from 1979 until it was canceled on April 12, 2007 following public objections to Plural noun he Past tense verb on-air.
