To celebrate Hanukkah, we lights <u>Plural noun</u> each night, starting with just one candle, going all the way up to eight. We do this because of a tradition that after the Jews rededicated the Temple, there was only enough <u>Noun</u> left to light the Temple menorah for one night, but the oil burned through <u>Number</u> whole

nights!

Another Hanukkah tradition is to eat lots of fried food, especially latkes, which are fried potatoes, and sufganiyot

which are fried dough. Sometimes we'll throw a little <u>Noun</u>_____into the mix, for a little fruit. Another thing we do on Hanukkah is play dreidel, which involves sitting in a circle with friends or family and <u>_____verb____</u> ending in ing_____around a little top with <u>______</u>sides. Each of the four sides has a Hebrew letter, and all four letters together stand for a phrase we remember every year on Hanukkah: Nes Gadol Hayah Sham, which in English means "A Great Miracle Happened There."; In Israel of course, the <u>______</u>has one letter different from all the dreidels outside <u>______</u>.

We hope everyone has an excellent Hanukkah this year, and gets to spend lots of time with their friends and family, <u>Verb ending in ing</u> games, eating food and remembering the miraculous victory of the Maccabees over the ancient Greeks!
