Jell-o

JELL-O is either a powder containing powdered gelatin, flavorings and sugar or artificial Plural noun that is dissolved in boiling water, then chilled and allowed to set or pre-prepared pudding or gelatin that comes in a small Adjective cup. Sometimes fruit, vegetables, whipped Plural noun or other ingredients are added to make often elaborate desserts that can be molded into any number of shapes. JELL-O must be refrigerated until served, and once set properly, it is normally eaten with a Noun.

The pudding line is cooked on a stovetop in hot Plural noun then chilled until it sets, or in the case of the instant pudding, simply dissolved in cold Plural noun and then chilled. The no-bake pie line is generally mixed with Plural noun and then poured into an included crust, and allowed to set in a refrigerator.

Gelatin has been well known and used for many years. It was popularized in the Proper noun era with spectacular and complex jelly moulds. Previously, gelatin was sold in sheets and had to be Past tense verb which was very time-consuming. In 1845, industrialist Name of a person (who invented the first steam-powered Noun obtained a patent for powdered gelatin derived from the bones of Plural noun.
